

IMPORTANT INFORMATION ABOUT YOUR DRINKING WATER

Creek Co RWD #7 Did Not Meet Treatment Requirements

Our water system recently violated a drinking water requirement. Although this was not an emergency, as our customers, you have a right to know what happened, what you should do, and what we did (are doing) to correct the situation.

Creek Co. RWD #7 Has Levels of Total Trihalomethanes (TTHMs) Above Drinking Water Standards

We routinely monitor the presence of drinking water contaminants. Testing results we received for indicated time period(s) show that our system exceeds the standard, or maximum contaminant level (MCL), for total trihalomethanes (TTHMs). The standard or MCL for TTHM is 0.080 mg/l. It is determined by averaging all the samples collected at each sampling location for the past 12 months. The level of total trihalomethanes averaged at our systems location was the following:

What should I do? There is nothing you need to do unless you have a severely compromised immune system, have an infant or are elderly. These people may be at increased risk and should seek advice about drinking water from their health care professionals.

What does that mean? This is not an emergency. If it had been, you would have been notified immediately.

Some people who drink water containing total trihalomethanes (TTHMs) in excess of the MCL over many years may experience problems with their liver, kidneys, or central nervous system, and may have an increased risk of getting cancer.

Creek Co RWD # 7 Has Levels of Haloacetic Acids (HAA5) Above Drinking Water Standards

We routinely monitor the presence of drinking water contaminants. Testing results we received for indicated time period(s) show that our system exceeds the standard, or maximum contaminant level (MCL), for Haloacetic Acids (HAA5). The standard or MCL for HAA5 is 0.060 mg/L. It is determined by averaging all the samples collected at each sampling location for the past 12 months. The level of haloacetic acids averaged at our systems location was the following:

What should I do? There is nothing you need to do unless you have a severely compromised immune system, have an infant or are elderly. These people may be at increased risk and should seek advice about drinking water from their health care professionals.

What does that mean? This is not an emergency. If it had been, you would have been notified immediately.

Some people who drink water containing haloacetic acids in excess of the MCL over many years may experience may have an increased risk of getting cancer

What happened? What is being done? When will the violation be resolved? In the process of replacing all filter media and doing upgrades to CLO2 equipment.
